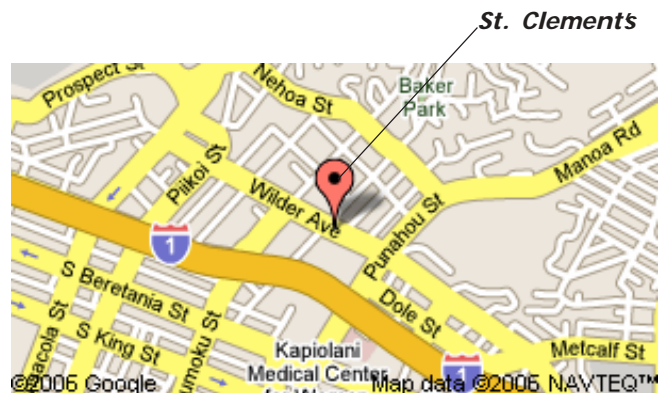

Finally, the status of the *Falls of Clyde* is a subject that our Society is very concerned about. The ship was delayed going into drydock in January because of weather conditions, but has now been further delayed because of undisclosed hazardous materials inside the vessel that has created an environmental clean-up problem before the ship can go into drydock. Also, the \$500,000 endowment that was

set up for maintenance of the ship has not yet been turned over by Bishop Museum to Friends of Falls Of Clyde (FoFOC), which is causing a financial hardship. FoFOC has been handling the challenges as they come along because saving the *Falls of Clyde* is the right thing to do for our community.

Worldwide Toast to Robert Burns

On the January 25, Robert Burns' actual birthday, but the morning after our Burns Night, a group of members and friends met at O'Toole's Pub to toast the bard once again.

The goal was to participate in a Guinness World Record attempt for the Largest Simultaneous Worldwide Toast. Thirty-seven glasses were raised in Hawaii at 11 a.m. (9 p.m. Scotland time) "To the Immortal Memory of Robert Burns."

The Scottish organizers of the Worldwide Toast say there was no record set for the Guinness Book, but the group in Hawaii had great fun and even attracted a *Star-Bulletin* photographer.

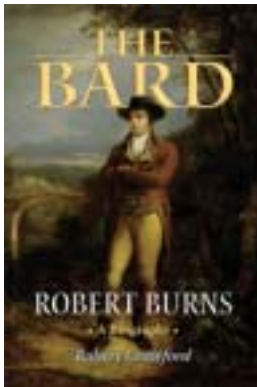

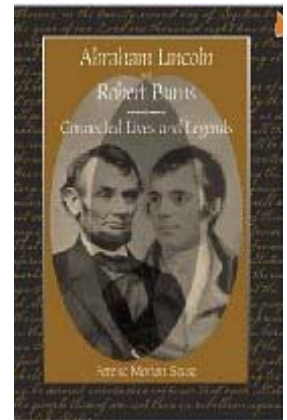

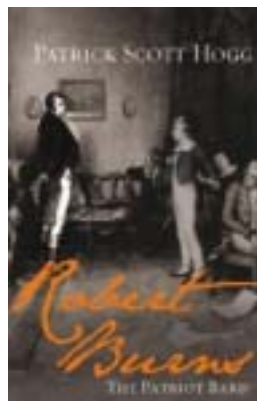
THE BARD ROBERT BURNS A Biography

At January's board meeting, the chieftain informed the group of a new biography of Robert Burns, *THE BARD*, written by St Andrews Univ Modern Scottish Literature Professor Robert Crawford & just published by Princeton Univ press. The published price is \$35, but a group discount of 40% is available to Scottish societies ordering five or more. After the meeting, members of the Scottish Educational Research Grant committee decided to order 10 copies of *THE BARD* to have available for purchase at Burns' Night Jan 24. That night we sold them all at a special price of \$25, with \$1.90 per book going to the SERG scholarship fund. So, heady with success, the SERG committee—with board approval—has ordered ten more copies which will be available at the April Highland Gathering.
