Moffat, Scotland located in the southern borderland of Annandale Valley, has been named Scotland's darkest town. This is because in 2016, Moffat was designated as an International Dark Sky Community. The streetlights were directed downward so it is much dimmer on the streets as visitors walk towards the Moffat Community Observatory where a 16-inch Meade telescope allows

guests to view the night-sky. Weather permitting you can see the rings on Saturn. The best time to visit is in October during the Moffat Walking Festival.
