Our headlining entertainment for the Festival & Games, "Switchback," a Celtic duo made up of Brian FitzGerald and Martin McCormack, will perform at the ceilidh and throughout the Festival. The annual **Princess Ka'iulani Tribute** will be held **Thursday, April 5th** at 6:00 p.m. at the Royal Mausoleum of Hawaii, located at 2261 Nu'uuanu Ave. The Princess was the daughter of Archibald Scott Cleghorn and Princess Miriam Likelike. Each year we honor the Princess remembering her contributions to Hawaii. Young visiting dancers from two schools of Highland dancing will dance to honor the memory of the young Hawaiian-Scottish princess.

National Tartan Day is Friday, April 6th. The Celtic flags will be raised at the State Capitol at 8:00 a.m. At 11:30 a.m. there will be a reading of the Proclamation of Celtic Days in Hawaii at the Hawaii State Senate. At 12:00 noon, the Proclamation will be read at the Hawaii State House of Representatives. From 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. come wave to passersby along with members of all the Celtic groups at the State Capitol near the Father Damien statue on Beretania Street.
