Exactly 200 years ago this August, Edinburgh excitedly welcomed an important visitor for two weeks of parades, parties, and reviews. Everyone in Scotland, who could do so, came to Edinburgh to join in the excitement and show off their new clothes. The visitor was the recently crowned King George IV, the first reigning monarch to visit Scotland in 200 years. His visit to Scotland was stage managed by Scotland's best-selling novelist and popular civic figure, Sir Walter Scott. Because of Scott's romantic vision of Scotland and its past, the 17 days of this visit had a major effect on Scotland's sense of itself and still influences how the world thinks of Scotland even today.

This year, the 200th anniversary of the visit, seems like the time to find out what happened. Why did the king wear pink tights with his new red tartan kilt outfit? Why were the local cartoonists amused at his appearance? What nursery rhyme reminds us of an event the king participated in? What drink did the king request during his visit and why was this hard to get? If you had an invitation to one of these events, do you think you would want to attend?

On **Saturday, Sept 3rd**, led by Brian Richardson and Lillian Cunningham, we will explore George IV's visit and its effects on Scotland. Daft Days of August 1822

- Aug. 12, 1822:** Regalia of Scotland paraded from Edinburgh Castle to Holyrood Palace.
- Aug. 14, 1822:** King's ship, *Royal George*, arrived in the Firth of Forth
- Aug. 15, 1822:** King's carriage took him up Leith Walk to Edinburgh to accept the keys to the city at a theatrical, medieval gateway.
- Aug. 16, 1822:** King stayed at Dalkeith, his residence for the visit.
- Aug. 17, 1822:** King wore his Highland outfit at a levee at Holyrood.
- Aug. 19, 1822:** King listened to addresses at Holyrood.
- Aug. 20, 1822:** King's Drawing Room, He kissed ladies from 2:15-3:30pm.
- Aug. 21, 1822:** Scott dined with the King at Dalkeith.
- Aug. 22, 1822:** Grand Procession from Holyrood to Edinburgh Castle.
King greeted crowds from battery of Castle. Accepted Huzzahs.
- Aug. 23, 1822:** Reviewed cavalry. Grand Ball in Assembly Rooms
Event judged a triumph & lasted until after 1:00 am.
- Aug. 24, 1822:** Honors returned to Castle with small procession.
"Tumultuous" Civic Banquet in Parliament House.
- Aug. 25, 1822:** King attended Presbyterian service at St. Giles.
- Aug. 26, 1822:** Private Visit to Holyrood Palace apartments of King's ancestor,
Mary, Queen of Scots. Caledonian Hunt Ball
- Aug. 27, 1822:** King attended theatrical performance of Scott's novel *Rob Roy*.
- Aug. 29, 1822:** King visited Hopetoun House, 12 miles from Edinburgh.
Joined his ship at South Queensferry and departed.

Welcome our New Council Members

Mary Jill Ackerman was born and raised in Honolulu, Hawaii. She obtained her undergraduate degree from Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs, NY, and her post graduate degree in Traditional Chinese Medicine from Samra University in Los Angeles, CA. 1. Queen Elizabeth, besides being Queen of Great Britain, which includes Scotland, could be considered a Scottish Queen in perhaps 3 other ways. Name 1 other way.
2. The oldest building in Edinburgh is named after a Scottish Queen. What is the building and which Queen was she?
3. Who was the youngest Queen that Scotland ever had?
4. Where did Mary, Queen of Scots, spend her last night on Scottish soil?
5. The first king of Britain was born in Scotland. Who was his mother and where was he born?
6. What residential connection was there between H.R.H. Princess Margaret and Shakespeare's favorite Scottish King, Macbeth?
7. Shortly before he died, James V of Scotland, was told of the birth of a daughter. He is supposed to have said, "It came wi' a lass and it will gang wi a lass." What was 'it' and who were the lasses? (He was right.)
8. Queensferry stands just beside the Forth Bridge. Which Queen gave it that name?
9. Mary, Queen of Scots, could speak French better than she could speak English. Where was she born?
10. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, has 2 royal homes in Scotland. What are they called and where are they?

Answers to Scottish Queens and Princesses Questions:

1. Queen Elizabeth has Scottish ancestry through her mother, Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon. She owns property in Scotland (See Question 10). She frequently vacations in Scotland.
2. The oldest building in Edinburgh is St. Margaret's Chapel, the first building inside Edinburgh Castle. St. Margaret, Queen of Malcolm Canmore, died in the Castle in 1003, and this eleventh-century building was named after her.
3. Princess Margaret, Maid of Norway, succeeded to the Throne of Scotland when she was three years of age. She died (in 1290) before reaching Scotland.
4. Mary, Queen of Scots, spent her last night (15th May 1568) on Scottish soil at Dundrennan Abbey, Auchencairn. She was then taken to imprisonment in England and was executed many years later.
5. The first King of Britain, James VI of Scotland and I of England, was the son of Mary, Queen of Scots. She gave birth to James in Edinburgh Castle on 19th June 1566.
6. The Queen Mother, also named Queen Elizabeth, when she was Duchess of York, gave birth to Princess Margaret at Glamis Castle in 1930. Macbeth (died 1057) was Thane of Glamis.
7. James V was referring to the Stewart line of Kings of Scotland. It came with Marjorie Bruce, daughter of Robert the Bruce, whose son by a Stewart was the first of the line. It ended with James V's daughter, Mary, Queen of Scots, for her son became King of Britain.
8. The first regular user of the ferry, some 800 years before the Forth Bridge was built, was St. Margaret, wife of Malcolm Canmore. The ferry made it possible for pilgrims to travel easily between Edinburgh and St. Andrews.
9. Mary, Queen of Scots, was born in Linlithgow Palace (8 December 1542) but was taken to France when she was a child as part of a treaty with France.
10. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, owns and uses Balmoral Castle, Deeside, Aberdeenshire, as well as the Palace of Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh.
